5-5-5 Tolling of the Bell

Long before there were telephones and radios across our great nation, fire departments used the telegraph, using special codes to receive fire alarms from those once familiar red fire alarm boxes which stood on practically every street corner of America.

When a firefighter was killed (fell) in the line of duty, the fire alarm once would "tap out" a special signal. This would be tapped out as five measured dashes - then a pause - then five measured dashes - then a pause - then five more measured dashes (5-5-5).

This came to be called the "Five-Five" and was broadcast over the telegraph fire alarm circuits to all station houses in the vicinity. Heard outside on the streets, with the department's windows open, the resonating echo was similar to that of fire stations of old where fire alarm gongs sounded the location of thousands of emergencies throughout the history of our growing country.

Lawrence J. Phipps, Sr. Hanover Fire & EMS

Lawrence "Jeff" Phipps was a Battalion Chief with Hanover Fire-EMS who originally joined the department as a volunteer firefighter in 1985, following in his father's footsteps who served as a firefighter with Henrico County. Jeff also served as a firefighter with the Richmond International Airport Fire Department. With Hanover, Jeff served in the Fire Marshal's Office, as the Battalion Chief



of Training, and then went on to become the senior Battalion Chief in Operations. Jeff was known for his strong command presence and understanding of firefighting tactics. No matter what emergency came Jeff's way, he would always handle it in a calm and professional manner.

Jeff was diagnosed with cancer when he went for a colonoscopy after his 50th birthday. After his diagnosis, he became a champion for ensuring firefighters get their colonoscopy as soon as they are able. His actions caused other department members to find issues early enough, that could be treated before becoming serious. Before his passing, Jeff became involved with the Firefighter Cancer Support Network, where his wife, Carolyn, continues to volunteer today.

Jeff was well known for his sense of humor. As an example, he specifically asked that an ice cream truck, with music blaring, be present as people left his funeral so they could each have a cone and a smile on their way out. Jeff's legacy lives on through his two sons, Jackson and Jeffrey. Jeffrey now serves as a firefighter with Hanover Fire-EMS.

Lyndell N. Woods Fort Lewis Volunteer Fire Department

Captain Lyndell Nelson "Dale" Woods, 60, was called from service on Sunday, November 8, 2020, at his home. He was born on Tuesday, March 8, 1960, in Stuttgart, Germany to Rodney Leroy and Maria Liebelt Woods of Salem, Virginia. Dale was a member of the first



graduating class of Salem High School in 1978. He spent more than 22 years with Petroleum Marketing Incorporated. Among his many community involvements, the heart of it all was his volunteer career with Fort Lewis Fire Department. Dale joined the day after he turned 21 years old; from March 9, 1981, he served actively until December 31, 2003. Following his retirement, he continued to support Fort Lewis Fire Department in their recruitment of new volunteers. He was involved in local Boy Scout Troops and coaching Glenvar Recreation League Soccer. Being outdoors always held a special place in Dale's heart; he was an avid hunter and fisherman. He was recognized as a Master Angler I by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. Dale was a member of the National Rifle Association. He enjoyed a vast collection of firearms and took pride in teaching others about safe and responsible handling of them.

He was preceded in death by his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Gofflief Leibelt, paternal grandfather, Roy L. Woods and one aunt, Linda DeGroot. His paternal grandmother, Lillian Ratliff Woods passed after Dale's death. In addition to his parents, he is survived by his wife, Jewel M. Woods, son, Daniel Hunter Woods and wife, Erin, Tampa, FL, his step-daughter, Jenneal Jones & grandchildren, Lana and Kalen Fink of Christiansburg, sister, Monica Potts and husband, David of Salem, brother, Clifton Woods and wife, Chrissy of Mechanicsville, very special aunt, Wanda Waltz of Salem, 3 other step-daughters and grandchildren, nieces, nephews and Molly his border collie.
